





GB TO NEW ZEALAND 1937



GREAT BRITAIN'S FIRST TOUR TO NEW ZEALAND

Official Great Britain rifle teams have toured to New Zealand eleven times, with five of those visits occurring since 1990 and the most recent in 2010. New Zealand's first tour to GB was by ship in 1911 (and then by air in 1953), but GBRT's first reciprocal visit was in February 1938, at the end of a long voyage by a 14-man team. Prior to arrival in New Zealand for a short visit, the team toured South Africa and Australia extensively, before shooting in the Empire Trophy Match at the Empire Games in Sydney. Touring was a very different proposition in those days. As Lord Cottesloe wrote at the time, Commander Swanston's GB team "was absent from home for six months and circumnavigated the globe." Almost half that time was spent at sea.

 17 - 21 Feb 1938 Sail from Sydney to Wellington
 24 Feb 1938 Test Match at Wellington

1 Mar – 5 Apr 1938 Sail from Wellington to Southampton



His Majesty's Lieutenant for Buckinghamshire Colonel The Lord Cottesloe C.B.

After long sea voyages, a defeat by South Africa and Southern Rhodesia in the Bloemfontein test match and good hospitality in both South Africa and Australia, the Great Britain team shot in the Empire Match at the Empire Games, reversing Australia's 2 point short range lead to win by 23 points. In that match Swanston proved himself at least sixty years ahead of his time. Most international teams and many others these days have firers shoot on both sides of the coach, no matter their dominant eye/hand, following the 2007 GB Palma team's adoption of the technique that the County of London team had tried out successfully a few years earlier. They had believed it to be an innovation; however, Swanston's account of the 1938 Empire Match explains: "In order to keep within the time limits and to facilitate coaching, the person next to fire took up his position on the other side of the coach from that occupied by the firer some four or five shots before his predecessor had finished. There was, therefore, no break in the continuity of firing - No. 2 starting immediately No. 1 had finished, and so on throughout." While the coaches were not in the habit of winding sights for their firers in those days and Swanston concedes of his wind readers that "we did not collaborate as a general rule", this was otherwise a thoroughly modern practice, as was Swanston's arrangement of pre-tour training matches against the English XX Club and his preference for "young men rather than veterans in his team", which "was well justified by the event."

GREAT BRITAIN'S FIRST TOUR TO NEW ZEALAND cont...

Commander Swanston's official account of the New Zealand leg of the tour reads: "On February 18th, we left Australian territory for New Zealand in S.S. 'Awatea', having spent the meantime in quarters at Coogee while some took advantage of the opportunity presented by our hosts to see the Genollan caves. Hoddle remained in Australia on business. We were accompanied in the 'Awatea' by the New Zealand and South African teams, all being seen off by Mr. Jamieson, Major Dakin, Mr. Spencer, and many others who had contributed to our happy stay in Sydney. The Governor-General of New Zealand – Lord Galway – was returning in the ship from the Sydney celebrations and the three teams had the honour of being presented to him on board. Our arrival in Wellington on 21st February was delayed a few hours by fog, which caused some difficulty in making punctual attendance at Parliament House where all teams, together with the returning New Zealand athletes [from the Empire Games] were given an official welcome by Ministers acting on behalf of the Prime Minister.

"The New Zealand National Rifle Association's National Meeting was due to take place from February 25th to March 2nd, but it was not possible for us to remain for a later sailing and take part in it. The Wairapa Rifle Association, however, were good enough to hold their Meeting on 23rd February at Trentham for our convenience and both the South African team and ourselves took part. We found an organization similar to those existing in Australia, though on this occasion the number of rounds had to be reduced owing to the large number of competitors. Several of the British team took high places in the aggregates and matches that were shot, and we looked forward to the test match the following day with some optimism. Whatever the reason, however, we did not excel in this match. The conditions were certainly difficult – a strong rear fishtail producing variations from 1 to 9 right, but our diagrams show that we did not lose an undue proportion of shots laterally and that the elevations maintained by nearly all the team did not compare with those they had recently been achieving at Sydney, particularly at 300 yards. The match conditions were for teams of 10 firing 2 convertible sighters and 10 shots to count at 300, 600, 800 and 900 yards.



"The Match was attended by the Governor-General and by the Minister for Defence, the Hon. F. Jones, who congratulated South Africa on the conclusion of the Match. There could have been none more conscious than ourselves that South Africa were not in their usual form in the Empire Match, and this return to winning form must have been a source of justifiable satisfaction to their leader – Col. Bodley, who went on to win the New Zealand King's on the same range less than a week later. We shall remember our matches with them in Africa, Australia and New Zealand, with particular pleasure, and although we were fortunate enough to win the Empire Match, they have the satisfaction of scoring the rubber against us.

"In New Zealand, as in everywhere else, we received hospitality we cannot forget. Colonel Cresswell – a past Chairman of the N.Z.N.R.A. – made it his business to be our particular host. We had the advantage of being the neighbours at Liverpool, Sydney, of Captain Masefield and the N.Z. team and the friendships started there were cemented by our stay in their country. It is the aspiration of all those interested in Rifle Shooting in New Zealand to send another team to Bisley. We hope that our visit may help them to gain that object, because their tenacious effort in the Empire Match and their victory over us in the New Zealand Match indicate that they have the marksmen to make the venture a successful one."

The current GB team's budget is in the region of £160,000 (NZD300,000). In 1937-38, the team was funded by £2,791 6s. 3d. in donations from third parties and £100 5s. 11d. from the Overseas Teams Fund, of which £24 10s. 4d. was returned. The team spent:

- on steamship fares
- on travel and hotels
- on clothing
- on rifle equipment, spoons etc.
- on sundries
- in total

£65 13s. 5d.

just over £200 a head for six months' touring (c.£13,000 in today's money)





David Calvert - Captain



David started fullbore target rifle shooting in Northern Ireland at Campbell College School, Belfast in 1965. His first international team experience followed three years later with Ireland, which he has represented over each of the past 50 years. His first GB team representation was in 1975 on tour to Canada, though followed by a self-imposed 15 year gap due to work and family commitments. International shooting involvement then picked up again and David has since represented GB on around 50 occasions, both at home and abroad; mostly in Target Rifle, but also in the Service Rifle, Match Rifle and Small-bore Rifle disciplines.

This will be David's 6th shooting tour to New Zealand, having first visited for the Auckland Commonwealth Games in 1990. This will also be his 8th consecutive Palma match and he is looking forward to his move from the firing point to the different responsibilities and challenges of captaincy. Away from the ranges, his main interests are golf, skiing and flying, the latter in a part time role as a flying instructor in the Royal Air Force Reserve.

Chris Hockley- Vice-Captain

Chris Hockley returns to New Zealand shooting for the 5th time. His first was shooting for Wales in 1990 at the Commonwealth Games and subsequently in 2003 for GB, with an RAF team in 2009 and as an individual in 2018. He has toured to all the major and many of the smaller shooting countries, usually as Manager, Vice-Captain or Captain of RAF, Welsh or GB teams. His individual best moment he says was a bronze medal in the 1998 Commonwealth Games in Malaysia.

Chris spent 36 years in the Royal Air Force before transferring to Cranfield University where he has spent 13 years, teaching and supervising post graduate students and researchers in the fields of reliability, maintainability and logistic support. He retired in 2017 although still runs the occasional short course for the University but hopes to spend more time on the golf course and the bowling green.



Dave Rose - Adjutant



Dave started shooting at Epsom College where he finished as the Captain in a record setting year and the second of two Ashburton wins, then continuing at Southampton University and with his club The Old Epsomians. Focussing on Fullbore more in recent years he has toured over 10 times and visited all the major shooting nations around the world, to date the high point being part of the victorious Palma team in 2015 in the USA.

A self confessed shooting and touring addict Dave is delighted and honoured to be the Adjutant for the Palma team in 2019 and is looking forward immensely to returning to New Zealand in 2019 after touring in 2018 with the excuse of "needing to recce for logistics and planning". And most essential it was too! Dave seems to have acquired the Adj title over the last few years and is working his way towards the Adj big 5...

Dave lives in Surrey having moved out of the hectic centre of London and in his spare time spends much of his time at Bisley (funnily enough). A committed petrol-head he has decided recently to slow down and the BMW M3 has made way for the comfort and practicality of a Range Rover complete with fridge!

Nick Tremlett - Head Coach

Nick is one of the relics on the team, having started his shooting career over 45 years ago, and first competing internationally abroad 42 years ago! He has had his fair share of success over the years, including a Queen's Prize and several Match Rifle championships, but considers it all a question of monkeys and typewriters.

Recently Nick captained a GB Target Rifle touring team for the first time, to South Africa in 2017, where GB completed the rare clean sweep of Australia, Protea and RSA International matches. Not one to shirk a challenge Nick is now looking forward to being main coach for GB on the Palma team.

Having been to Trentham in January 2018 he is relishing the opportunity to compete in the World Championships in 2019, despite Trentham's habit of delivering chastening experiences to any who underestimate its perplexing zephyrs.





Matthew Charlton - Coach

Matthew started shooting at RGS Guildford when he was 13. This is his 11th Great Britain tour and his 3rd to New Zealand. Wind coaching is Matt's main strength and was his role on previous GB, Scotland and club tours to Canada, Australia, South Africa, USA, New Zealand and the West Indies. Matt has 49 "Big Five" appearances under his belt and has coached GB wins in all the major international matches.

Matt is a teacher of modern languages and mathematics, having 'retired' from institutional stockbroking in the City a few years ago to do something he loves. He sculls, having rowed competitively, and enjoys cycling, skiing and snowboarding when there's occasionally time around loving daughter Ursula and being looked after by wife Ellie.

Matthew started shooting in 1992 at the Royal Grammar School, Guildford and is looking forward to target coaching with his fellow Old Guildfordians (and Bruce) in 2019. This will be his 8th tour with the Great Britain Rifle Team and his 2nd to New Zealand, having visited Trentham ranges in 2010. Whilst he has enjoyed a smattering of individual successes, most notably winning the Long Range Aggregate in the US Fullbore Championships in 2015, he much prefers wind coaching in team matches. This will be Matthew's 5th World Championships having previously represented GB at 3 Palma Matches and once in the F-Class rifle discipline.

Away from shooting Matthew and Sarah live in Chelmsford and were joined by their son, Arthur, in early 2018. He is looking forward to the tour so he can get some sleep.

Derek Lowe - Coach

Derek began his shooting in the cadet force at RGS Guildford, moving on to the Athelings in 1991, Oxford University over 1991 – 1994 and the Surrey county team since the late 1990s. He has been fortunate enough to represent England or Great Britain in various guises in Australia, Canada, Jersey, Kenya, Namibia, Scotland, South Africa and Zimbabwe. He is looking forward to adding New Zealand to the list on this, his 10th, tour for GB. Keenest at long range and in a team environment, he also spends a lot of time in match rifle.

He is an experienced charity trustee and, in order to ensure he finds no rest, has served as the NRA's Treasurer since 2013.



Bruce Winney - Coach



Bruce has been going to Bisley longer than he likes to remember and even when work commitments intervened has usually managed to make at least one day of the Imperial meeting. He is looking forward to returning to New Zealand for the second time since he first toured with the first GB U25 touring team 27 years ago. More recently his first full GB cap was with the successful 2014 team to Canada and the USA, and he toured the West Indies with England in 2017. His first National and Mackinnon caps, in 2018, are indelibly etched into his memory.

Away from the range, he spent many years working among the idyllic dreaming spires of Oxford but gave that up for a two year extended sabbatical with his wife, driving round South America in a small yellow van. David first started shooting at the Royal Grammar School, Guildford, in 1983 and has shot the Imperial Meeting at Bisley every year since, apart from 1997 when he was working in Tokyo. This will be David's 9th GB tour, and a long awaited return to Trentham having last visited in 1992 as Captain of the first ever touring GB Under-25 team. David's top achievements to date include making 19 Queen's Finals (coming 2nd twice, most recently in 2012) and 15 top 50 finishes in the Grand, including unfortunately narrowly missing out on a top-3 place in 2017 courtesy of the Prince of Wales. He has been part of the winning GB Palma Teams in Canada in 2007, Australia in 2011 and Camp Perry in 2015.

Away from Bisley, David is a pension trustee and accountant for the Civil Aviation Authority, managing a government-backed trust fund.

Nigel Ball



Nigel began his shooting career whilst serving in the Fleet Air Arm, the flying side of The Royal Navy, but his main role since becoming a civilian has been to impart marksmanship skills to the youth of the nation through his position as a shooting master first at Greshams School in Norfolk and for the last 9 years at Wellington College in Berkshire. He is often seen at Bisley with a crowd of pupils avidly trying to wreck the school rifles. Gunsmiths have become his best friend but the school bursar seems to have different opinions.

Nigel has a selection of Grand Agg crosses, Queens final badges etc but his main love is the touring side of GB shooting and the camaraderie that comes with it. New Zealand will be his 26th GB team tour and his 5th Palma Match. Interestingly a fellow team member was the Palma Captain in 2003 and gave Nigel his first taste of World Championship shooting, an appetite he has continued to feed ever since.

On home soil, Simon has Captained Great Britain in the World Championships in 2003, and England in the Mackinnon and National matches.

Off the range, Simon is now spending much of his time making sure his wife, Liz, is kept comfortable, warm and dry in their 500 year old Devon cottage (but would rather be sculpting instead!).

HISTORY OF THE PALMA MATCH



HISTORY OF THE PALMA MATCH

The Palma Match – the World Championship of long range rifle shooting – is the most prestigious team event in our sport. With teams trialling and training shooters and coaches for years before competing, it is no wonder that a Palma badge from a competitive nation is a highly sought after item, and a match medal all the more so.

Shooters have competed to earn these honours since September 1876, when the Great Centennial Match was held in the state of New York on Creedmoor rifle range, more recently the site of a psychiatric hospital. That first Palma Match was contested by Australia, Canada, Ireland, Scotland and the USA on a 36 inch bullseye, with the hosts beating Ireland into second place by 22 points. With no sighting shots and with firers both prone and supine, it had much in common with the Elcho Match, but the .44 cal, 520gr projectiles were rather larger than we're used to.

Since then, there have been a further 29 Palma matches, featuring 30 different countries, including some we might no longer expect to see, such as Peru and Cuba (1928's runners-up). The USA dominated the early years, winning seven of eight matches from 1876 to 1928. 1877 saw Great Britain's first appearance; they hadn't responded to 1876's invitation and, after losing to the USA, didn't reply in 1878, eventually returning in 1901.

That match was at Sea Girt, where black powder had been replaced by bolt action rifles with .30 cal and .303 jacketed bullets. Canada were the first non-American winners and took the match outside the USA for the first time, to Rockville in 1902. There, Great Britain's first win allowed them to hold the match in 1903 at Bisley, where the USA recorded the highest score but the match was declared void rather than claimed by them or the British runners-up after a deviation from service rifle specification.

The first match at Camp Perry was in 1913, when Argentina took second place with 7.65mm Mausers, but the Great War interrupted the series until 1924 when Connaught first played host (to an 'unofficial' match like 1923's uncontested edition and 1925). A 20 inch V-bull was introduced in the 1920s.

There followed a 38 year gap between matches, with the Great Depression and Second World War being factors. The hiatus coincided with the disappearance of the original Palma Trophy, a 7.5 foot tall Tiffany creation with a copper spread eagle and silver laurel wreath atop a panel, mounted on an ornate steel shaft, bearing the word "PALMA", which had been outside the office of the Secretary of War in the 1930s. It had been presented "in the name of the United States of America to the riflemen of the world", for which reason an official Palma Match must feature the USA among the competing nations.

HISTORY OF THE PALMA MATCH

Before the reinstatement of the match proper, a 'preliminary' match was held at Camp Perry in 1966. The hosts took the honours but Canada turned the tables at Connaught the following year with GB also in attendance. The modern Palma era had begun, comprising yearly matches until 1974, with the home team winning all but once, probably aided by the use of rifles and ammunition issued by the host. The last of the annual matches was the first held south of the Equator, at Bloemfontein where South Africa triumphed just as they did 25 years later.

From the 1976 Bicentennial Match onwards, the Palma moved to a three year and then a four year cycle, encompassing a wider range of venues including Australia and New Zealand. Since 1985, the team size has been standardized at 16 shooters, while 1995 brought the two day course of fire. The 1992 iteration saw the introduction of the World Individual Long Range Rifle Championship; it was also the year that Great Britain first made use of revolutionary team shooting methods that yielded a first victory since 1970, albeit one of six in the last seven matches.

This year's match promises to be a highly competitive affair, following significant advances in team shooting across the globe. The competing teams are Australia, Canada, Channel Islands, Great Britain, Kenya, New Zealand, South Africa and the United States of America. Most of those countries are also entering teams in the Veteran, Under 25 and Under 21 World Championship matches.

To date, the Palma Match has been 'officially' hosted by:

USA 12 times, Canada 8 times, Great Britain 4 times, and Australia, New Zealand and South Africa twice each.

Cumulative standings in terms of wins (including the 'preliminary' match but excluding the void match and the four 'unofficial' matches in two of which only the USA competed:

USA 13 (in 30 attempts), Great Britain 8 (in 20), Canada 4 (in 29), South Africa 2 (in 9), Australia 2 (in 16).

Other countries, continents and provinces to have competed are:

Argentina, Channel Islands, Cuba, East & Central Africa, Europe (CPC), France, Germany/West Germany, Ireland, Jersey, Kenya, Namibia, Natal, New Zealand, Norway, Peru, Scotland, Sweden, Zimbabwe/Rhodesia.

THE SILVER FERN



THE SILVER FERN

To Maori, the silver fern has long stood for strength, stubborn resistance and enduring power. It has been a symbol of New Zealand since the 1880s, following its adoption by the New Zealand Natives, and it was included on the All Blacks rugby jersey in time for their first overseas tour in 1905.

However, its history as a sporting emblem is longer than that, having originated in the sport of rifle shooting.

In 1853 the HMS Sparrow called at New Plymouth, staying in New Zealand waters for ten years and eventually being converted to steam before departing. The Royal Navy challenged the local Army garrison to a team rifle match, shot on the Rewa Rewa range, Taranaki.

The New Zealand shooters picked the silver fern growing in the area and pinned the frond to their uniform pocket as a good luck charm. They beat the Royal Navy and thereafter adopted it as a good luck symbol.





Matthew Button

Matthew started shooting at the age of 14 as part of his Duke of Edinburgh's award, following his father and grandfather into the sport. He continued shooting through school (winning the Ashburton with Oakham) and has shot for Lincolnshire since 1985. While studying medicine at London University he managed to combine his overseas elective studies with the 1995 World championships in New Zealand and enjoyed a second attempt at reading the Trentham winds in 2018. He has also enjoyed shooting tours to Canada, Kenya, Namibia, South Africa and the USA. Visits to Bisley are now encouraged, as his 3 children have learnt to cycle around camp, with varying amounts of assistance and elastoplast.

Matthew now works as a Vascular surgeon in Brighton where he gets regular practice at remaining calm in challenging situations. Interests in medical education and Trauma surgery make work life busy and varied, he is hoping not to need any of these skills whilst competing in the Palma matches.



David Crispin



David works in his own engineering company building rifles and accessories. This will be David's eighth tour with a GB team having previously toured to New Zealand, Canada, South Africa, West Indies and the USA. His shooting started at age 13 with the Air Cadets, shooting the No.4 .303 rifle at the age of 15. That hurt with its brass butt plate and wearing only a blue shirt, but after the bruising subsided he was back for more with a hand towel for shoulder padding. After doing the Cadet Bisley meeting in 1979 and 1980 he was set for a lifetime of Bisley shooting. He's very much looking forward to getting his teeth into a Whittaker's Peanut Slab again.

Tom started shooting with the Air Training Corps at the tender age of 13, initially very unsuccessful but with persistence and training he improved enough to gain a place on the 2006 Athelings team for his first overseas tour. Since 2006, Tom has toured a further eight times to countries such as Australia, South Africa, USA and the Channel Islands where he has represented GB Under 19, GB Under 25, GB and England. Tom's notable successes to date include finishing in the Top 50 of the Grand Aggregate at Bisley and South Africa and winning the Gurkha Appeal with his first ever 75.15. Tom plans to build on the success of 2015-17 where he completed the 'Big 5' and hopes the invaluable experience he gained will lead to an even stronger performance in the 2019 Palma match.

Away from shooting Tom works as a Finance manager in London and in his spare time enjoys watching and playing football and hitting the gym.

Tom Drysdale




David Luckman

This will be Jane's fourth visit to New Zealand and the renowned Trentham ranges, of which she has fond memories -and she is of course very much looking forward to taking part in what will be her eighth Palma match.

Whilst team shooting is Jane's favourite, she is also an accomplished individual shot having won a number of important individual competitions, including the Grand Aggregate and St George's Vase at Bisley. Away from the ranges, Jane enjoys skiing, gardening- and walking her enthusiastic Labrador.

Parag Patel



Parag first started shooting at Epsom College and his prodigious talent was in early evidence as he won the Canadian Grand Aggregate as an Atheling in 1994. 

She is currently based in the Midlands and working in the NHS, occupying her spare time with plenty of netball or sailing. She has recently taken a short career break to travel South America and Canada and is continuing the travels after her work with GBRT is done in New Zealand.

THE CLUBS AT TRENTHAM

The make-up of the clubs at Seddon Range has changed a little since the Great Britain team's last visit in 2010, though a couple have changed a little.

KARORI RIFLE CLUB

The Karori Club was formed as a defence rifle club in 1892. It was made up of local volunteer militia to promote shooting, which took place at various ranges around Karori Borough at distances up to 1000 yards. The Pearce Shield, awarded to the Karori Club Champion, is named after a former Karori Borough Mayor who was a member. Other prominent members of the club have included Judge Ongley, Major Ron Wakefield, Brigadier General Johnson (head of the New Zealand Expeditionary Force to France in the First World War) and HT Marshall who won the Military Cross. The Marshall Shield, another Karori trophy, is a replica of his award.

Karori Club moved to Trentham in 1904 due to residential growth in the borough. Over the years it has had a proud record in shooting and its members have won the Ballinger Belt multiple times, starting in 1910 with Mr. G. Halliday. Karori has won the Commonwealth Postal Shoot and also the New Zealand Postal Match in 1995 and 1997, both times with a record score. The club has also had numerous members represent New Zealand and a couple have even shot for Australia.

In the 1978 season, when the Karori Club rooms were rebuilt following a fire, the club won every competition it entered. Karori has a history of being innovative and embracing change and is also the host of the New Zealand 1000 yard championship.

PETONE RIFLE CLUB

Petone is one of the oldest rifle clubs in New Zealand, having its origin in the Petone Martini-Henry Rifle Club, founded in 1890 by a group of Petone Naval Volunteers. In 1902 the club became known as the Petone Defence Rifle Club, having become part of the nationwide defence scheme. Since 1956 the name has been The Petone Rifle Club (Inc.). Today the club has one of the best clubrooms in New Zealand, including some unique and historical items. Its members range from Canterbury to Hawkes Bay.

The oldest sports trophy in New Zealand, the Ballinger Belt, owes its existence to a member of the club. The Ballinger family from Wellington were among the prime movers in the formation of the club. In 1873 the Government donated for annual competition a black leather belt with a silver-ornamented cartridge pouch, the whole supported by a shoulder strap. It was won by Arthur Ballinger in 1893 and twice more by 1907, when he was entitled to retain it under the rules. He donated it to the NRA of NZ for perpetual competition and it became known as the Ballinger Belt. It has been back in Petone members' hands on numerous times since.



THE CLUBS AT TRENTHAM



TRENTHAM RIFLE CLUB

Trentham Rifle Club was formed earlier this decade from the merger of two old clubs: Upper Hutt RC and Onslow RC. It uses the former premises of Upper Hutt, with Onslow's building used from time to time by community groups.

The origin of the Upper Hutt side of the club is lost in the mists of time but by the 1870s, local farmers, bush and mill workers who were all members of the volunteer militia established a rifle range in the area of Dunlop's Factory and Maidstone Park. Soon afterwards, the railway from Wellington to Wairarapa was constructed and a substantial goods shed built adjacent to the range, conveniently on those days when shooters needed shelter.

It is believed that the Upper Hutt Defense Rifle Club came into being between 1885 and 1890, using the goods shed as a club base. In 1908 the club venue and range moved to McGhie's farm at Maori Bank, then after the Great War to Burrell's Farm in Mangaroa and later to the bigger, better Trentham ranges used today.

Over the years, Upper Hutt has won the BNZ Champion Teams and Hawkes Bay Collins Shield more often than any other club and the Commonwealth Postal Match several times, but it had to wait until 1973 before Barry Price became its first member to win the Ballinger Belt, in a year when the club won all the team matches.

The Onslow side of the club was rather younger, formed in 1943 at a voluntary parade of B Company Ngaio and C Company Khandallah of the Marshall Home Guard, under Major Alex Ross. The club started shooting on Prosser's Farm in Elsdon, Porirua and moved its activity to Trentham in 1949/50 and its clubrooms there in 1953 – later replaced in 1981. Onslow's first Ballinger Belt winner, Keith Walshe, worked a night shift during the whole week of the shoot in 1963, and talked of practising in the weeks before the shoot by dry firing at flies!

Having enjoyed a few sociable evenings in the Trentham RC clubhouse under its former guise, we wish the combined club well and look forward to some more.

PROVINCIAL RIFLE CLUB

Great Britain team members have also enjoyed a great deal of hospitality at the Provincial Rifle Club during past visits, including in 2010. It is more a base for shooters visiting from outside the Wellington area than a local club. Its (theoretical) list of Ballinger Belt winners is thus quite lengthy!



Previous GBU19 tours to the Channel Isles, Canada and South Africa prepared William for his first GB tour to Canada and the USA in 2014, while on home turf he regularly competes for Surrey and England. Notable successes include winning the Bisley 500 yards Aggregate, Olle Beckett Memorial Trophy, the Times and St. George's Stage II as well as competing in multiple Queen's Finals.

When not on the range, William works as an Equity Trader in the City of London, enjoys cross country running and has a passion for British-made socks... a story for another time!

Pete started his shooting career 26 years ago at Gresham's School in Norfolk, guided at first by John Rowley and later by Nigel Ball. Pete first toured Canada in 1999 with the Athelings and then again in 2002 and 2007 with the GB and GB Palma Teams. He has also toured the Channel Islands with the National Team in 2001 and 2017, Australia in 2005 with GB and South Africa in 2006 with GB, and been involved with the Mackinnon, the National, the Kolapore, the Norfolk Team and OGRE.

The Cover Design...

New Zealand is well known for its elaborate patterns in most art work and martketing. But what does it mean? Traditionally the New Zealand artwork is taken from the indigenous Maori but in Wellington, the closest city to Trentham, there is a population made up of various ethnic origins including European, Asian and Pacific Islanders.

To reflect this, Rick wanted to design something that wasn't specifically tied to any one ethnicity or indeed any civilisation or society within them but something that celebrated the art work derived over many years of history and diverse culture.



HISTORY OF THE BALLINGER BELT



HISTORY OF THE BALLINGER BELT

In 1873, the Government donated for annual competition a black leather belt with a silver-ornamented cartridge pouch, the whole supported by a shouldr strap.

The second of five members of the Ballinger family to win the belt was Arthur Ballinger, in 1893. He won twice more, the third occasion being in 1907 when, under the rules as well as in accordance with sporting tradition of the era, he was entitled to keep it. He donated it to the National Rifle Association of New Zealand for perpetual competition and it became known as the Ballinger Belt.

Starting with Cpl. W. Ballinger in 1879, the Ballingers have won the belt seven times in total over a 117 year perid (1879, 93, 95, 97, 1907, 69 and 96). More recently, the Collings family has been in the ascendancy, with five wins since 1977.

The famous W.N. Masefield has been the most successful individual, with five wins (the last four as Captain Masefield) from 1914 to 1948.

In 2000, three-time winner John Whiteman became the first to clean all the ranges; Brian Carter has been the most successful recent competitor, with three wins since 2006 and was also the highest placed New Zealander last year.

The Ballinger Belt has been won by overseas competitors on 17 occasions, with Australian Mark Buchanan the only foreign double winner. We should expect the local shooters to face another stiff challenge this year.




